WHEREAS, A 6th grade student at Flower City School No. 54 in Rochester, New York, Jayde Snyder earned this high honor for her essay on the Emancipation Proclamation; and

WHEREAS, A 7th grade student at the School of the Arts in Rochester, New York, Abigail Wilcox earned this high honor for her essay on the march from Selma to Montgomery; and
