Wednesday, January 20, 2010 at a benefit concert themed “Somos Una Isla”, Senate President Malcolm A. Smith accepted \$50,000 donated by Dominican band Aventura, and the group's tour sponsor, Anheuser-Busch, on behalf of the New York State Senate to give relief to the millions of Haitian citizens displaced by a massive earthquake last week.

The sold out Madison Square Garden concert featured the band from the Dominican Republic which shares a border with Haiti. Aventura donated \$25,000 from concert proceeds and Anheuser-Busch matched the \$25,000.

Aventura is one of the first entertainment groups to perform a benefit concert to help the millions of Haitian citizens affected by the earthquake last week.

"Tuesday's devastating earthquake has affected many Haitian New Yorkers who are frantically trying to reach their relatives and friends," said Senate President Pro Tempore Smith. "I extend my deepest sympathies to all those impacted by this horrific event and thank Aventura and Anheuser-Busch for their donation that will help restructure Haiti and save lives."
