## Senator Rubén Díaz to Chair Public Hearing on the Reauthorization of the Older Americans Act

Albany, New York - State Senator Rubén Díaz, Sr., Chairman of the New York State Senate Committee on Aging announced today that he is chairing a public hearing on the reauthorization of the Older Americans Act. The hearing will take place on Friday April 9th, from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., 250 Broadway, New York City in the Senate Hearing Room on the 19th floor.

"After the federal legislation that created Social Security and Medicare, the Older Americans Act is perhaps the single most important piece of legislation for older New Yorkers," stated Senator Díaz. "Without it, services such as meals programs, senior centers and case management services might not exist," he continued.
