

Senate Report: Cut Red Tape to Create Jobs in New York State

To make New York State more economically competitive, we all know we have to reduce taxes and control spending. But, we also need to focus on efforts to eliminate unnecessary red tape and regulations that stifle the private sector's ability to create new jobs.

My colleagues and I in the New York State Senate Majority Coalition have just issued a comprehensive report to highlight specific rules, regulations and practices that may put New York's businesses at a competitive disadvantage. The report is the product of surveys,

meetings, community outreach and the input of over 100 business owners, advocacy organizations and individuals that participated in one of nine industry-specific public forums conducted throughout the State. Those who participated identified more than 2,000 rules and regulations that should be reviewed.
