The parade began with mass at St. Benedict's Church and was followed by the community's annual St. Patrick's Day breakfast. Participants then proceeded to the parade route at noon, kicking off at the corner of East Tremont and Lafayette Avenues, then trailing onto Harding Avenue and finally concluding at Harding and Brinsmade Avenues.

During the parade, Senator Klein and his staff handed out shamrock sugar cookies to hundreds of hungry marchers and parade goers. More than 21 bands and 60 different groups marched throughout the day. All participants wore green in honor of St. Patrick's Day, including shamrock shades, top hats and a variety of green buttons and pins.
