records and does so with respect to birth parents who will have the option to file a contact preference if they choose so. In addition, it allows adoptees to gain knowledge of their religious and ethnic heritage and access to medical information that may be necessary for preventive health care and illnesses that are linked to family history

This bill deserves to be brought to the full Senate and Assembly for a vote, and I urge every New Yorker to express support for the bill, and ask legislative leaders
