Syracuse, NY (3/4/16) - State Senator John A. DeFrancisco was proud to join with various business owners, farmers, and healthcare leaders from throughout the Central New York community to express concern over the Governor's proposal to increase the minimum wage to \$15 an hour.

"Many of my constituents have called my office and met with me on several occasions to express their concern that a \$15/hour minimum wage could force them to lay off workers, raise consumer prices, or even close their doors for good. I am standing by my principals and standing with my constituents, who are telling me that this will hurt them and their employees badly," said Senator DeFrancisco.
