The state launched the Citizen Preparedness Corps Training Program in early 2014 with the goal of training 100,000 New Yorkers "to be first responders in their own homes and in their communities." The program seeks to provide citizens with tools and resources to help them better prepare for and respond to emergencies and disasters. Trainings are led by the New York National Guard together with experts from the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services' Office of Emergency Management and the Office of Fire Prevention and Control. The local training sessions are coordinated with local county emergency management personnel.

Across the Southern Tier and Finger Lakes, training programs have already been held and well received in a number of locations, including Bath, Corning, Hornell, Horseheads, Ithaca and Penn Yan.
