## Skoufis Hosts Virtual Legislative Roundtable for First Responders

Last year, Skoufis, Chair of the Senate Investigations and Government Operations Committee, released his investigative report on code enforcement in New York State. As a result, in February, the State Senate passed a package of bills based on recommendations in Skoufis’ report.
