## Hornell Art Walk set for Saturday evening

HORNELL — For one night only, Hornell will become an interactive art

museum. The Hornell Art Walk, an annual event coordinated by Brett Hunter's "Space and Place" class at Alfred University, is set for Saturday from 4-9 p.m. The event features 14 exhibitions located around the city.

The event also features students and faculty from Alfred University's Sculpture and Dimensional Studies division, the city of Hornell, and Maple City-based artists and organizations.

Saturday's art walk marks the culmination of a semester of effort from Hunter's students, one that included integration into the community. Hunter's class is held at the Hornell Community Arts Center on Thursdays and Fridays.

Hunter said that while this is the fifth annual walk. it's the fourth conducted by his students. The first effort was held by artists who happened to have exhibitions on the same day.

Alana Wesley's exhibit will be located at the Roadside Field on Route 21 across from Hope Cemetery.
