Bob was instrumental in securing Victor's Tree City USA designation from the Arbor Day Foundation. This, along with his coordination of Wreaths Across America, ensuring that wreaths are placed on service members' graves in local cemeteries, are among his many contributions.

Mr. Haggett continued to honor his commitment to fellow veterans as the Finance Officer of American Legion Post 931. He was also recognized for his service with an Honor Flight, a poignant tribute to his enduring contribution to the Nation and its veterans.

What moment in your service do you remember the most?

The brotherhood and camaraderie of the men I fought alongside, many whom lost their lives as heroes.

What valuable lessons or skills did you learn from your time in the military? I was a combat medic and received valuable medical training, as well as how to stay calm and focused under pressure. Leadership skills are the most-used skills I think I took away from the military. We are raising four boys and two girls, and they look up to me daily!

What do you love most about America?

I am grateful I was able to build a life here in this great country from scratch, and experience the freedoms and liberties not found elsewhere.

Nominators, what impact has the nominee had on your life?

Sean has had an immeasurable impact on not only our local community, but also the veterans community at large. We are a certified foster family in Wayne County, and Sean has been a fantastic mentor and support to over 25 foster children who have lived in our home, as well as becoming a permanent father to two children we have adopted. Sean recently completed a bicycle ride from Buffalo to NYC in an effort to raise funds for needed medical equipment for our disabled son. In 2012, he organized a fundraising endeavor and ran from Oregon to lowa to raise funds for two veterans charities.
