Dear Governor Hochul:

We write to convey our support for the inclusion of **mixed-use commercial**, **retail**, **and residential development on the Harriman State Office Campus as part of the state's \$1.7 billion Wadsworth Laboratory consolidation investment**. As proposed in <u>S.1613</u> <u>Fahy/A.5918 Romero/McDonald</u>, 7 acres of the 27-acre Wadsworth Laboratory property would be designated for mixed-use commercial, retail, or residential development.

Secondly, the legislation requires the creation of a master plan for the full redevelopment of the underutilized Harriman Campus to maximize the use of what may be considered the 'Uptown Parking Lot District'. This is the state's largest public investment in Albany since the 1960s. Capitalizing on this would help reconnect the Harriman Campus to the surrounding community and neighborhoods. Ensuring that we are maximizing space for mixed-used development on the Harriman Campus as part of this \$1.7 billion investment would allow the City of Albany and Capital Region to harness the full economic multiplier effect of the Wadsworth Laboratory.

In 2021, a coalition of elected officials worked with your office and applauded your efforts to ultimately <u>retain the Wadsworth Laboratory</u> here in Albany. Since that time, we have met numerous times with your office and relevant state agencies to urge a 21st Century-economic development design on the Harriman Campus, including a more holistic approach, as indicated in the correspondence below:

- A <u>September 2021 letter</u> urged the convening of a Harriman Campus working group to identify opportunities to transform and redevelop this state-owned land, including examining parts of the 'ring roads' to repurpose additional acreage.
- A <u>February 2022 letter</u> conveyed concerns related to the addition of up to 1,000 new parking spaces and urged the convening of a Harriman Campus working group to identify and analyze how to transform the Campus.
- A <u>December 2022 letter</u> urged that we consider transforming the campus layout, adding developable land, and bringing the UAlbany School of Public Health to campus. The letter also urged the convening of a working group of stakeholders to comprehensively develop the region's "Research Triangle".

- In July 2023, your office issued an <u>Executive Order mandating state agencies to review</u>
 <u>state-owned lands</u> to determine whether state sites could be used either for housing
 development or to support nearby housing developments.
- An October 2023 Albany Times Union op-ed urged the state to leverage the Wadsworth investment as an impetus to transform the Harriman Campus for the 21st Century, and raised serious concerns on a 27-acre perimeter fence and more parking spaces.
- A <u>December 2023 letter</u>, signed by local elected officials, conveyed the serious concerns
 with preliminary plans that included excessive parking spaces, no potential for retail or
 housing units, and urged the inclusion of a comprehensive traffic study regarding
 repurposing of the Campus and the surrounding 'ring roads'.
- A <u>February 2024 letter</u> detailed many of the above concerns repeatedly and urged that a
 working group be convened and included as part of the project.
- Written and oral testimony was provided in <u>March 2024 and December 2024</u> at public hearings that entailed many of these and the community's concerns.
- A <u>December 2024 letter</u> was sent following the conclusion of the Dormitory Authority of
 the State of New York's (DASNY) issuance of its scoping document, State
 Environmental Quality Review (SEQR), and response to collected public comments.
 This urged the relevant state agencies engaged on the project to engage with elected
 officials, stakeholders, and community groups to address concerns raised previously.
- In <u>January 2025</u>, <u>legislation</u> (S.1613 Fahy/A.XXXX Romero) was introduced to require 7 acres of the 27-acre Wadsworth parcel be set aside for retail and housing units, in line with your administration's Executive Order requiring state agencies to identify and develop land under their control that can be repurposed for housing and residential units.
- In January 2025, the <u>final SEQR scoping document</u> was issued that repeatedly ignores all public comments and letters submitted as part of this process.

An astounding 63% of the City of Albany's properties are considered tax exempt, including the Harriman State Office Campus. Encouraging spinoff development on these acres can also help to alleviate Albany's unique tax burden as the state's capital city. Additionally, encouraging greater walkability and multi-modal transportation will reduce the need for additional parking spaces, stimulate the local economy, and incentivize needed private sector investment.

Please note, these repeated requests to prevent another 1960s-style design will not impact the footprint of the Wadsworth Lab design *nor cause any delay* as we are all eager to see shovels in the ground as soon as possible. A 21st-Century design limits the number of surface-level parking spaces, reserves dedicated space for new housing stock and small businesses and reconnects the Harriman Campus with the surrounding neighborhoods as critical components of this project.

Again, as a broad coalition of elected officials, labor leaders, neighborhoods groups, community advocates, and more, we urge you to designate 7 acres of the 27-acre Wadsworth Laboratory property for mixed-use development as set forth under S.1613/A.5918 and fully capitalize on the opportunity provided by this \$1.7 billion project to our surrounding community and City of Albany.

Thank you for your time and attention to this matter, and for your Administration's continued commitment to the greater Capital Region. We look forward to your response and working with you and your office on this critical project.
