Facts About Ebola

Last weekend, I joined Mayor de Blasio, NYC Department of Health Commissioner Dr. Mary Bassett and government colleagues and hospital officials in touring Bellevue Hospital Center in our district, home of the city's Ebola treatment unit. As Mayor de Blasio has said, our healthcare workers are deserving of our highest gratitude and respect for their efforts in caring for the city's first Ebola patient, Dr. Craig Spencer, who himself cared for Ebola patients in West Africa.

The City and State Health Departments stress that Ebola can only be contracted from having *direct contact* with the bodily fluids of an infectious person. Ebola is not spread through the air or by water, or in general, food. Healthcare workers caring for Ebola patients and the family and friends in close contact with infected persons are at the highest risk of getting sick because they may come in contact with the blood or bodily fluids of sick patients. Save the Senior Center at Our Lady of Pompeii Church

After learning on October 23 that the pastor of Our Lady of Pompeii Church at 25 Carmine Street doesn't intend to renew the lease of its longstanding senior center, I helped spearhead a letter to Cardinal Timothy Dolan seeking intervention by the Archdiocese. I was joined by Congressman Jerry Nadler,

Borough President Gale Brewer, State Senator Daniel Squadron, Assembly Member Deborah Glick and Council Members Corey Johnson and Margaret Chin. I have personally urged the pastor to negotiate with Greenwich House, the not-for-profit organization which operates the senior center. Please join me and my colleagues in government, Greenwich House and seniors at a rally and press conference this coming Monday, November 3 at 12:30 p.m. outside the church on the corner of Carmine and Bleecker Streets. Law Signed Lowering Speed Limit to 25 MPH

On October 27, I was pleased to stand with the courageous families of traffic victims as Mayor Bill de Blasio signed historic legislation lowering New York City's speed limit to 25 miles per hour. I was a strong supporter of the legislation authorizing New York City to implement this key component of the Mayor's <u>Vision Zero Action Plan</u> to eliminate traffic fatalities. Studies show lowering the speed limit, even by five miles per hour, can significantly reduce traffic-related injuries and deaths. Our new citywide speed limit will greatly improve the safety of all New Yorkers.

Extend Reverse Mortgages to Co-ops

I recently helped spearhead a letter with Congressman Jerry Nadler, Senator Chuck Schumer, Assembly Member Deborah Glick and Council Member Corey Johnson, to the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), asking the agency to extend reverse mortgages to co-op owners. Under HUD's Home Equity Conversion Mortgage (HECM) program, homeowners over age 62 can apply for reverse mortgages to leverage some of the equity in their homes for other expenses. Currently co-op owners, who face rising maintenance fees and other costs of living, aren't eligible for the program. In the letter, we cited the approximately 70 renters at West Village Houses co-op, whose statutory rent stabilization ends in 2018, as constituents who could potentially avoid losing their long-time homes by utilizing the HECM for Purchase program. Silencing Nightly Noise from East Village 7-Eleven

Last Tuesday, I joined constituents at a New York City Environmental Control Board (ECB) hearing where an administrative law judge ordered the 7-Eleven convenience store at 170 Avenue A to immediately turn off its noisy air conditioning units daily from 8 p.m. to 8 a.m. and move all of its offending equipment permanently.

Since February of this year, I've worked closely with affected neighbors and Manhattan Community Board 3 to silence 7-Eleven's offending refrigeration and air conditioning units. I have also helped secure numerous noise violations from the City's Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), which precipitated the decision. While I'm dismayed that 7-Eleven and its landlord didn't heed our calls to resolve the matter voluntarily, I applaud the ECB and DEP for requiring them to take action now to bring relief to neighbors. West Side Tenants Conference – Saturday, November 1

On Saturday November 1, <u>Housing Conservation Coordinators</u> will be holding its annual West Side Tenants Conference at Fordham University, School Of Law, 150 West 62th Street at Columbus Ave, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The conference will have workshops on important topics to tenants, such as finding affordable housing, fighting MCIs and combating tenant harassment, among others. Legislation to Modernize Birth Certificates

I have introduced the "Modern Family Birth Certificate Act" (\$\s.7942\$) to modernize the parentage designations on New York State birth certificates. The legislation allows parents to choose to be designated as either "mother," "father," or "parent" instead of the current designations of "mother/parent" and "father/parent," which leads some female-identified same-sex couples to list one female parent as "father." We must ensure that these families have the same rights as anyone else, including the right to have their families acknowledged accurately on birth certificates. Heat Season Has Begun

In New York City, from October 1 through May 31, landlords are legally required to maintain an inside, daytime temperature of at least 68° F if the outside temperature falls below 55° F, and a nighttime, inside temperature of at least 55° F if the outside temperature outside falls below 40° F. If you are not receiving adequate heat in your apartment, you should call 311 and be sure to write down your complaint number.
