Corning I-86 work soon to be underway

On Sunday, westbound Interstate Highway 86, from Exit 48 to Exit 47, will be detoured onto State Route 352, from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m., for the pavement rehabilitation project, said Annette M. Burdett, a Department of Transportation spokesman. All traffic will be required to exit the highway at Exit 48, travel west on state Route 352 for about three miles then re-enter I-86 at Gibson. Weiner: Beat Trump Jr. like 'rented mule'

NEW YORK (AP) -Democratic former congressman Anthony Weiner, who resigned in disgrace amid a sexting scandal, said on Tuesday he would come out of political retirement to thwart a potential mayoral bid by Republican Donald Trump Jr. and would beat him "like a rented mule." Trump Jr., the son of Republican presidential nominee Donald Trump, has been floated as a possible challenger to Democratic Mayor Bill de Blasio in 2017 since his well-received speech in support of his father at the Republican National Convention last week in Cleveland. Weiner, who's attending his party's national convention in Philadelphia, was asked about the rumored Trump Jr. candidacy, and the cocksure former congressman playfully suggested he would end his political exile to take on the son of the equally brash Trump, a billionaire real estate mogul.

HOUSTON - Texas prosecutors on Tuesday dropped the last remaining charges against two California anti-abortion activists who made undercover videos of themselves trying to buy fetal tissue from Planned Parenthood, agreeing with the defense's argument that the grand jury exceeded its authority by investigating the activ-

Merritt and Daleiden, who founded a group called the Center for Medical Progress, had rejected plea deals offering them probation.

"I'm glad the First Amendment rights of all citizen journalists have been vindicated today," Daleiden said after the hearing. "And I would just note that Planned Parenthood is still under investigation by the United States Congress, as they should be, because they are the real criminals in this matter."
