Dear Acting Chairman Fernando Ferrer,

We write today as a group of bipartisan and unified elected officials from various levels of state and local government that represent approximately 279,000 daily commuters on the Long Island Rail Road system, which serves approximately 89 million customers annually.

Recent actions taken by the Metropolitan Transportation Authority Board, such as the Commuter Rail Fare Increases, will result in increased fares for LIRR commuters that will unreasonably affect the constituents of our districts, and residents throughout all of Long Island. This decision stands in direct contrast to the recent decision by the MTA Board to raise Subway and Bus fares by a significantly lower magnitude in terms of real-cost dollars. Therefore, the planned rate increases will disproportionately increase fares for LIRR commuters, with the overall goal of increasing revenues for the MTA.

Under this plan, LIRR fares are expected to increase by approximately 4% over the next two years, which will result in an increased cost to commuters of approximately \$150-180 per year. On Long Island, we already face an increasingly high cost of living. An increase in LIRR commuter fares, coupled with the controversial Congestion Pricing proposals, will result in further cost of living increases which could not only force our constituents to seek residency elsewhere, but may also result in a decrease in ridership if commuters find the higher rates to be unaffordable. Any decreases in ridership will result in subsequent decreases in revenues collected. Therefore, when put into practice the Commuter Rail Fare Increases may have an adverse effect on total revenues collected.

Furthermore, there is currently no plan in place to utilize revenues raised from these increases for critical infrastructural upgrades to the LIRR system. Revenues will seemingly be used to address the fiscal deficit that the MTA currently faces. Suburban commuters that utilize MTA regulated services, such as the LIRR, are being unduly burdened and will face disproportionate fare increases compared to riders of New York City based systems, such as the Subway and Bus Systems. For these reasons, we are opposed to any fare hikes for commuters utilizing the LIRR system at this time.

We do understand that revenues must be raised to address budget deficits and investments in infrastructural upgrades. We ask that the MTA Board consider an alternative proposal that includes a 0% fare increase for monthly commuters with alternative increases for non-monthly tickets. We suggest that

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the MTA Board delay the Commuter Rail Fare Increases in order to properly consider this alternative proposal, and to allow for adequate public hearings so that our constituents' concerns can be addressed.

We look forward to hearing from your office and starting a dialogue to address our concerns.
