Dear Senator Flanagan:

It is my pleasure to submit the annual report of the Senate Standing Committee on Higher Education for the 2017 legislative session. The Committee maintained its commitment to supporting and examining ways to bolster New York's higher education sectors, as well as its oversight of the various professions licensed or seeking licensure by the State Education Department.

The most significant topics discussed by the Committee throughout the Session were restoring and enhancing maintenance of effort provisions (S.1596-A) and enacting a five-year capital plan (S.1625) for the State University of New York (SUNY) and City University of New York (CUNY). For a second time, both bills passed both houses and were sent to the Governor for his signature. The Governor vetoed both measures. The bills would have provided proper operating and capital funding to our public university systems.

Several other significant higher education bills were enacted throughout the Session. Chapter 298, sponsored by Senator Serino, exempted the International School of Photography from having to register as a licensed private career school based on the programs it offered. This technical correction was necessary. Chapter 454, sponsored by Senator LaValle, created an exemption where teachers already holding graduate degrees do not have to take the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) if such teacher applies for another graduate program.

The 2017-2018 Enacted Budget saw several significant developments. Basic maintenance of effort provisions were restored for SUNY and CUNY, and both systems saw an increase in capital project funding. The Legislature advocated that any increases should be flexible so colleges could choose whether they wanted such capital funding to go toward critical maintenance or new capital projects. Community college base aid also saw a \$50 increase per full time equivalent (FTE), which provided for a total of \$6.45 million in additional aid. The Senate also secured \$300,000 in aid for SUNY for increased access to mental health services.

The Governor signed several bills related to the licensed professions. These include providing title protection for doctors of physical therapy, counting representation in the New York State Dental Association, authorizing and allowing pharmacists to dispense and substitute interchangeable biological products, creating limited licenses for speech-language pathologists,

and changing the standards for mandatory quality of review of certified public accountants. A total of seven bills reviewed by the Committee were signed by the Governor.

I thank the Committee for its continued support and commitment throughout the 2017 Legislative Session. I remain dedicated to ensuring that New York State higher education is the best in the nation and look forward to working with the Committee members and the entire Senate on the various issues affecting higher education in the State.

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#### **COMMITTEE JURISDICTION**

The Senate Higher Education Committee is charged with the review and development of legislation addressing postsecondary education for New York State. This includes legislation dealing with the Board of Regents as well as more than 50 professions licensed by the State Education Department.

The Committee's jurisdiction, therefore, covers a broad range of areas including maintaining the quality of New York's public, proprietary and independent colleges and universities, continuing the State's long tradition of providing the nation's most generous student financial aid programs, and providing institutional aid to all sectors of higher education. In addition, the Committee plays a key role in program quality, access and opportunities for professional education, encourages academic and private sector cooperation, promotes research, and facilitates elementary and postsecondary partnerships. Furthermore, the Committee is deeply involved with the process by which practitioners acquire, demonstrate and maintain professional skills. A major component of the Committee's work is to consider change and expansion to the scope of practice of the state's professions, as well as to consider the licensure of newly created professions.

Another important responsibility of the Committee is to consider gubernatorial and mayoral nominations to the various boards, task forces and work groups within the higher education community.

#### 2017-2018 ENACTED BUDGET

The 2017-2018 Enacted Budget included a restoration and strengthening of maintenance of effort provisions for the State University of New York (SUNY) and City University of New York (CUNY). These provisions state that the Executive cannot fund the SUNY system at a level lower than the prior fiscal year, including fringe benefits, and any increases in the gap created by the tuition credit for the Excelsior Scholarship Program.

The Excelsior Scholarship Program was also created in the Enacted Budget. Full-time students who will complete their bachelor's or associate's degree on time are eligible for this program if such student attends either a SUNY or CUNY 2-year or 4-year program. In order to be eligible, the family's adjusted gross income (AGI) must be under \$100,000 in the 2017-2018 academic year, under \$110,000 in the 2018-2019 academic year, and under \$125,000 in the 2019-2020 academic year and beyond. To be on track to graduate on time, a student must complete 30 credits within an academic year. A scholarship program was also created for the private colleges to maintain parity between the sectors. The Enhanced Tuition Award (ETA) program mirrors the provisions of the Excelsior Scholarship in relation to income thresholds, and provides for an award of up to \$3,000 through the scholarship, as long as a matching award is made by the granting institution of up to \$3,000. Institutions who opt into the ETA program must also agree to freeze the receiving student's tuition at the rate the student paid when he or she was first awarded the scholarship and the rate cannot be increased for the duration of time the student remains eligible and receives ETA.

SUNY capital funding also saw significant increases this fiscal year, with added flexibility for new capital projects. \$450 million was designated for critical maintenance for senior colleges, \$100 million was carved out by the Legislature to provide for flexibility for new capital projects or critical maintenance use depending on the needs of the colleges, and \$100 million was designated for Upstate and Stony Brook hospitals. CUNY capital funding also saw a significant increase this year. \$224 million was designated for critical maintenance, and \$60 million was carved out by the Legislature to provide for flexibility for new capital projects or critical maintenance use depending on the needs of the colleges.

Community colleges received an increase in state operating aid for the seventh consecutive year. The increase of \$50 in base aid per full-time equivalent (FTE) brought base aid to \$2,747 per FTE. Additionally, the budget provided \$1.5 million for the Graduate Achievement Program (GAP), \$1.5 million for Small Business Development Centers, and over \$1.5 million for SUNY and CUNY childcare centers.

Important policy initiatives also advanced during the 2017-2018 budget cycle were creation of a part time scholarship award for SUNY and CUNY community college students, and a new child welfare workers scholarship and loan forgiveness program. The other budget initiatives include:

- \$10.4 million in funding for the Education Opportunity Programs and Education Opportunity Centers;
- \$5.9 million for the Higher Education Opportunity Program;

- \$9.3 million for the Hospital Subsidy for Upstate, Downstate and Stony Brook Hospitals; and
- \$4 million for increasing access to open educational resources.

#### MAINTENANCE OF EFFORT AND 5-YEAR CAPITAL PLAN FOR SUNY AND CUNY

A major highlight of the 2017 Legislative Session was the advocacy for enhanced maintenance of effort (MOE) provisions and establishing a 5-year capital plan for the State University of New York (SUNY) and City University of New York (CUNY) systems. Both MOE (S.1596-A) and the 5-year capital plan (S.1625) were important initiatives put forth with bipartisan support of both the Senate and Assembly.

When NYSUNY 2020 was first established in 2011, a maintenance of effort provision was enacted that would require the Governor to support both the SUNY and CUNY university systems at levels no less than the prior fiscal year. Both SUNY and CUNY had been recovering from cuts and unpredictable levels of funding. This original legislation was an agreement that the state, the public colleges, and the students would share in the goal of driving increased funding into the state higher education system. At that point, tuition increases were enacted that would total \$1,500 per student over five years. The intention was that these increases would then be matched by a proper investment by the state through the maintenance of effort provisions. This ensured that no cuts could be made to the SUNY and CUNY systems unless there was a fiscal crisis.

However, as the tuition burden increased on the students, the State did not keep its commitment to maintenance of effort because the Governor and the Legislature disagreed on what should be funded under this initiative. The Legislature advocated for the inclusion of all collective bargaining costs, any mandatory costs, utility costs, costs incurred by the SUNY university hospitals and fringe benefits in this provision. Due to this disagreement, the Legislature introduced legislation that stated this intention clearly in 2015. That legislation passed both houses, and was sent to the Governor. Unfortunately, the Governor vetoed both bills.

The maintenance of effort provision was set to expire in 2016, and during the 2016-2017 Budget, there was no resolution to this issue. The provision was allowed to expire. In the 2017-2018 Budget, the Legislature was successful in restoring the original maintenance of effort provisions again for another four years. However, this provision matched the language in 2011, with the addition of covering fringe benefits, and the gap created by the Excelsior Scholarship.

After the conclusion of the State Budget negotiations this year, S.1596-A was introduced to provide for more robust maintenance of effort provisions, along with companion bill, S.1625, that also provided for predictable capital funding for the two university systems over five years. The Legislature was able to pass these two pieces of legislation with unanimous support through both houses, again signaling the need for proper state operating and capital funding. Unfortunately, despite the Legislature's efforts, the Governor again vetoed both bills.

Both of these bills are critically important. Without proper investment in the human capital component in the form of full-time faculty, students will have a harder time getting the proper class offerings and the percentage of students completing on time will decrease. With the enactment of the Excelsior Scholarship and its goal of incentivizing on time completion, it is

hard to ignore the ramifications of the lack of a robust maintenance of effort provision and 5-year capital plan.

#### **COLLEGES & UNIVERSITIES**

The Higher Education Committee is responsible for the review and analysis of legislation affecting various colleges and universities, public and private, within the State. This year, much of the State budget discussions focused around the Excelsior Scholarship, but there were many other wide ranging issues that affected the higher education institutions in the State. The committee also reviewed legislation on a variety of topics, ranging from scholarship programs and TAP expansion for special circumstances, to issues dealing with private colleges and the public university systems.

#### Expanding the New York State STEM Incentive Program to Private Colleges

The Committee advanced legislation (S.2466-A) sponsored by the Chairman, that would include private colleges in the awards granted by New York State STEM Incentive Program. Currently, awards will only go to students who choose to attend a SUNY or CUNY school. However, there are many STEM programs at private colleges in New York State. This legislation would allow a student to get an award if that student chose to go to a private college. This legislation passed both houses of the Legislature and was subsequently vetoed by the Governor.

#### Expanding the New York State Masters in Education Teacher Incentive Scholarship Program to Private Colleges

The Committee advanced legislation (S.2482-C) sponsored by the Chairman, which would include the private colleges in the awards granted by the New York State Masters in Education Teacher Incentive Scholarship Program. Currently, awards will only go to students who choose to attend SUNY and CUNY institutions. This legislation would allow a student to get an award if that student chose to go to a private college. The legislation passed both houses of the Legislature and was subsequently vetoed by the Governor.

#### Extending TAP Eligibility for Students Forced to Transfer Due to Sudden College Closure

The Committee advanced legislation (S.1243) sponsored by the Chairman, that would extend eligibility for the Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) for undergraduate students who were forced to transfer to another institution as a result of a permanent college closure. This legislation was developed due to Dowling College's sudden permanent closure, and the ensuing issues many students had after they had to come up with an alternate plan to finish their education. This legislation passed the Senate.

## **Exemption for Certified Teachers Holding Graduate Degrees Pursuing Further Masters Education**

The Committee advanced legislation (Chapter 454 of 2017) sponsored by the Chairman, that created an exemption for certified teachers and school administrators who already hold graduate degrees. If such certified teacher or school administrator applied for another graduate program, they would not have to take the Graduate Record Examination. This would significantly help teachers and school administrators looking to get educational requirements to enhance their current career track.

#### **Expanding the Enhanced Tuition Award Program to Proprietary Colleges**

The committee advanced legislation (S.5891), sponsored by Senator Klein, that would open the Enhanced Tuition Award Program to students attending proprietary colleges in the State. Previously, when scholarship programs have been enacted, proprietary colleges were usually included. The Legislature felt this was an oversight that must be corrected based on past precedent. This legislation passed both houses of the Legislature and was subsequently vetoed by the Governor.

#### Exemption for Photography from Registration as a Licensed Private Career School

The Committee advanced legislation (Chapter 298 of the laws of 2017), sponsored by Senator Serino, that would exempt schools who provide non-credit bearing instruction on the art of photography from having to be registered as a licensed private career school with the State Education Department. This change alleviates non-credit bearing institutions from the costs and regulations required of their credit-bearing counterparts, thus allowing them to keep costs down for those who seek to advance their skills in photography as a hobby or art form.

#### THE PROFESSIONS

The Higher Education Committee is responsible for the review and analysis of legislation affecting various licensed professions within the State. This year, most of the discussions relating to the professions took place after the passage of the 2017-2018 State Budget. The Committee reviewed legislation on a variety of topics, ranging from licensure for athletic trainers, licensure for genetic counselors, licensure for school psychologists, limited licenses, professional discipline and more.

#### **Licensure of Athletic Trainers**

The Committee advanced legislation (S.1356-B), sponsored by Senator Funke, relating to licensure of athletic trainers. The legislation provides many needed updates to the athletic trainers' scope of practice, and provides clarity to the setting restriction that is in the current statute for registration of athletic trainers. The scope of practice would expand to allow athletic trainers to work with athletes off a sports field, and allow these professionals to have a more flexible role in training athletes who are not professional athletes. Allowing licensure for athletic trainers would provide more public protection, especially in dealing with sports injuries and concussion management. This legislation passed the Senate.

#### **Licensure of Genetic Counselors**

The committee advanced legislation (S.1323-A), sponsored by the Chairman, relating to licensure of genetic counselors. This legislation would create a scope of practice for genetic counselors, including education and experience requirements. This legislation also would deal with the unique issue of corporate practice for this profession and create a process to hold corporate settings that employ genetic counselors accountable in cases of wrongdoing. This legislation died in the Rules Committee.

#### Licensure of School Psychologists

The Committee advanced legislation (S.692-B), sponsored by Senator Ortt, relating to licensure of school psychologists. Currently, school psychologists are only eligible for certification in the State. This would elevate the profession to the level of licensure and provide for a pilot program for school psychologists to work with other professionals on the issue of heroin and opioid addiction in children. This legislation passed the Senate.

#### Protection of the Title of "Doctor of Physical Therapy"

The Committee advanced legislation (Chapter 354 of 2017), sponsored by the Chairman, that would protect the title "doctor of physical therapy" and the abbreviation "D.P.T." from use by any person who is unlicensed or not otherwise authorized by Article 136 of the Education Law.

#### Changing the Counting of Representation for the New York State Dental Association

The Committee advanced legislation (Chapter 288 of 2017), sponsored by Senator Croci, that would eliminate the requirement that voting representation be tracked differently from actual membership in a local component dental society. Due to the change in how the computerized membership system is used, this technical correction is necessary to allow the New York State Dental Association to implement the new computerized membership system.

**Limited Licenses for Speech Language Pathologists** The Committee advanced legislation (Chapter 202 of 2017), sponsored by Senator Funke, which allows for limited licenses for speech language pathologists. This will create consistency with the rest of the professions that allow for limited licenses.

#### LOOKING AHEAD: COLLEGE AFFORDABILITY

College costs and student debt continue to be major areas of concern for New Yorkers and the entire nation. The New York State Comptroller reported in September 2016 that, as of 2015, nationwide student loan debt was a little more than \$1.2 trillion. In New York State, the current student debt load is \$82 billion. Student debt in New York has doubled over the last decade.

One of the major problems with increasing student debt is the impact it will have on the economy in the future. Students leave their undergraduate education with high payments and lower incomes. One of the major issues is that public higher education is becoming less of an affordable option. NY-SUNY 2020, which allowed the Boards of Trustees to raise tuition by up to \$300 each year for the last five years, made many critical of increasing the burden on the students after both the State University of New York (SUNY) and the City University of New York (CUNY) raised tuition the maximum amount each year, totaling a \$1,500 increase in tuition per student at both institutions going forward. In the 2016-2017 Budget, SUNY and CUNY tuition was frozen for an academic year.

However, in the 2017-2018 Budget, tuition increases of up to \$200 were authorized for another four years. The Senate Higher Education Committee advanced two proposals, maintenance of effort and the 5-year capital plan for SUNY and CUNY, which would increase state operating and capital support. The Committee will look to increase scholarship opportunities for students across all sectors, public and private, and continue to advance initiatives that ease the burden on students in the coming legislative session.

- **Maintenance of Effort:** Advanced legislation that would require appropriate investment in public higher education. Much of NY-SUNY 2020 was predicated on the fact that the students put up an investment by paying increased tuition, and that the State must make a matching investment by providing better funding levels for SUNY and CUNY schools. This legislation (S.1596-A, vetoed by the Governor), requires that other specific costs are also covered by the State Budget, such as costs incurred by the health science centers, fringe benefits, collective bargaining costs, and other non-personal service costs such as utilities, building rentals and inflationary expenses.
- Additional TAP for students forced to transfer based on permanent college closure: Advanced legislation (S.1243) that would allow a student two additional semesters of TAP in the case where the student is forced to transfer because his or her college permanently closed.
- Enhanced Tuition Award Program: During the 2017-2018 Budget, this program was created for students attending private colleges. Students would be eligible to apply for an award based on an income threshold. For the 2017-2018 academic year, a student would be eligible if his or her family's adjusted gross income (AGI) is under \$100,000; for the 2018-2019 academic year his or her family AGI must be under \$110,000; and for the 2019-2020 academic year his or her family AGI must be under \$125,000. Each award would consist of up to \$3,000 from the State and up to \$3,000 in a match from the participating institution. Institutions were able to opt-in to the program on a yearly basis.

Institutions who opt in to the ETA program must also agree to freeze the receiving student's tuition at the rate the student paid when he or she was first awarded the scholarship and the rate cannot be increased for the duration of time the student remains eligible and receives ETA. The Committee will assess how this program is performing and if any legislation is necessary to boost participation.

- Expanding the STEM Incentive Scholarship to Students Attending Private Colleges: Advanced legislation (S.2466-A, vetoed by the Governor) that would expand eligibility for this scholarship to students attending private institutions. Unfortunately, the Governor vetoed this measure this year. However, this legislation is still necessary in order to give as many students the opportunity to attend the institution that is the best fit for them.
- Expanding the Masters in Education Teacher Incentive Scholarship to Students Attending Private Colleges: Advanced legislation (S.2482-C, vetoed by the Governor) would expand eligibility for this scholarship to students attending private institutions. The Committee still believes expanding access and choice is critically important for students across New York State and will continue to advocate for this provision in the upcoming legislative session.
- **NewSTART:** Advanced legislation (S.2554) that would allow eligible students to refinance their private student loans through the State at a lower interest rate. Students who attended a SUNY or CUNY institution and had private loans would pay back the state based on annual salary and ability to pay.

#### LOOKING AHEAD: THE PROFESSIONS

Three major issues discussed this Session will continue into next Session. The exemption in current law for those employed by certain agencies in the State from licensure was in the 2016-2017 Executive Budget. Both licensure of genetic counselors and professional discipline have been discussed by the Committee this year.

#### Social Work, Mental Health and Psychology Licensure

In 2002, New York State enacted laws to restrict the practice of psychotherapy and related services to those licensed by the State Education Department (SED). These laws exempted from the licensure requirements individuals employed by programs and services regulated, operated, funded or approved by the Office of Mental Health (OMH), Office of People with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD), and the Office of Alcohol and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS). Legislation enacted in subsequent years expanded these exemptions to the Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS), Department of Health (DOH), State Office for the Aging (SOFA), and the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision (DOCCS).

At the time of original enactment, the profession of psychology received a permanent exemption from licensure for individuals employed by governmental entities. However, the exemption from licensure for social workers and mental health practitioners was intended to be temporary.

Last year, in the 2016-2017 Executive Budget, the Governor estimated that the cost of ending the exemption for unlicensed professionals would be \$360 million. The Legislature, the agencies and the Governor have agreed to extend the exemption until 2018 in order to continue negotiations and come to an agreement so there is time to phase in the end of the exemption and hire more licensed professionals.

#### **Licensure of Genetic Counselors**

The field of genetic counseling has become extremely significant because it allows people to understand how their heredity contributes to risk for certain diseases and conditions based on family genetic history. This field has continued to evolve and grow rapidly, and genetic counselors have played an increasing role in the daily lives of New Yorkers and people across the country.

This year, the Chairman advanced legislation through Committee that would allow for licensure of genetic counselors. The main point of contention in the legislation is its corporate practice provision. While many genetic counselors technically work in corporate settings, there is concern that there is not enough protection for consumers who would utilize genetic counselors.

#### **Professional Discipline**

In 2016, ProPublica, an investigative reporting news source, published an article on the issues with professional discipline in New York in the nursing field. Before the release of this article, the chairs of both the Senate and Higher Education Committees had been working with the State Education Department (SED) to provide necessary reforms for disciplinary actions for bad actors who hold professional licenses in New York. The committee advanced legislation that would give SED the power of summary suspension in the egregious cases, and provide uniformity to all

the professions in their jurisdiction in regard to character and fitness. One of the major issues of contention was related to which professionals this should pertain to, and whether the current provisions in legislation provide for enough due process in serious cases.

#### NOMINATIONS

Pursuant to Title VII of the Senate Rules, the Higher Education Committee is charged with reviewing gubernatorial appointments to the Boards of Trustees of the College of Environmental Science and Forestry, Cornell University, City University of New York, City University Construction Fund, Higher Education Services Corporation, State University of New York and the State University Construction Fund. In addition, the Committee reviews nominations by the Mayor of the City of New York to the City University Board of Trustees.
