SAVING BABY R.

Few moments can match the deep emotion of holding your newborn child for the first time. However, for Mr. and Mrs. K. the experience took a sudden terrifying turn when they learned their baby was born with a rare malformation of her trachea and esophagus. Their baby needed immediate reparative surgery restoring the ability to eat and grow normally. The critical surgery has a high risk of lifelong complications.




Finding a team of doctors at Cincinnati Children's Hospital experienced in the successful repair of baby R's conditions lifted the parents' spirits, until their insurance company refused authorization, repeatedly. The hospital was part of their insurance network and the family was ready to cover the costs of transporting her; still, all the doctors' supporting arguments were ignored.

Desperate for a chance at a healthy future for their baby, they reached out to my office and together with the support of other elected officials, my staff member successfully advocated for an immediate review. Thankfully, the decision was reversed. On November 7, baby R's parents reached out with heartfelt emotion, sharing that having accessed the necessary expert care, baby R's surgery was successful and her prognosis is excellent.

CHAOS AVERTED

While many families across our district were busily preparing to celebrate the Jewish holidays, I was shocked to receive frantic calls from Kensington residents appropriately concerned that water main replacement was scheduled imminently in their neighborhood. The work would encompass weeks of water service disruptions and street closures causing major chaos. Holiday seasons generally entail busy preparation and large family gatherings.

My staff immediately contacted DDC and worked closely with Commissioner Grillo's staff to reschedule the work for a time that would not unduly impact the neighborhood. I am thankful for their reasonable accommodation.

Dear Senator Felder,



A Woman of Distinction

Nancy Sutton is a pillar in the lives of so many who are bravely battling cancer. Since founding the New York Cancer Center

in 2009, she has been committed to addressing the needs of cancer patients and their families. As President of the New York Cancer Center, Nancy and her dedicated staff provide patients with the knowledge, hope and support that empowers them to take an active role in their treatment and healing options.

Mrs. Sutton has a long and storied history of enhancing the lives of her community members. In 1992, in perhaps one of the most monumental days in the history of the social services infrastructure in South Brooklyn, Nancy founded and created Medstar, a division under the Sephardic Bikkur Holim Community Service Network. Her efforts in compiling a network of over 4,000 top doctors nationwide were essential to Medstar's



mission of providing high quality medical referrals to patients in the local community. In addition, Nancy and her staff oversee

extensive programming in health education and disease prevention to provide clients with the knowledge and resources to lead healthy lives.

Educated right in the heart of South Brooklyn, Nancy received her B.A. from Brooklyn College in 1973. She serves as a tour guide and educator at the Museum of Jewish Heritage and is a recipient of the New York City Comptroller's Leadership Award.

"It is my pleasure to honor Nancy Sutton, a woman truly deserving of this prestigious title, with this year's Women of Distinction award," said Senator Felder.

While off duty, on Sunday October 13, the quick actions of three heroic Police Officers of the 61st Precinct, which covers the Madison and Gravesend section of Senate District 17, saved the life of a heart attack victim. While at a bowling alley on Staten Island, Officers John Desiderio, Joseph Glorioso, and Giovanni Cucuzza noticed an elderly man collapse and took quick, critical action. The officers applied lifesaving measures restoring the man's heartbeat and consciousness before the ambulance arrived.

"I am honored to recognize officers Desiderio, Glorioso and Cucuzza whose sense of duty and compassion clearly guides them," said Senator Felder.

On August 7, Signal Maintainer Anthony Mannino was working at Newkirk Plaza station when he saw a woman standing on the track before horrified onlookers as the Q train was entering the station. Without hesitation, Mr. Mannino jumped onto the track and waved down the train operator with his bright orange vest. Unwitting spectators heaved a sigh of relief as the train came to a screeching halt right in front of Mr. Mannino and the stranger whose life he saved.

"I am proud to recognize Anthony Mannino for his remarkable act of heroism. His swift and selfless action averted a terrible tragedy."

BREAKING BARRIERS FOR NEW YORKERS WITH DISABILITIES

Long awaited ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) accessibility upgrades that include four brand new elevators are in service at the 62nd Street, New Utrecht Avenue station - an important connection between the N and D lines. Many more stations are slated for ADA accessibility upgrades across the city, including another station in Senate District 17. "Making our city subway system more accessible for people with disabilities, the elderly and people with young children must remain a top priority until every New Yorker can navigate freely through our city," said Senator Felder.

Less than a year ago, Senator Felder was proud to stand with his colleagues and Brooklyn Borough President Adams to launch Barrier Free Brooklyn, an initiative that reimagines and works to recreate our city with increased access for all.

NEXT STOP...

In an effort to modernize the bus system and better serve you, NYC Transit announced it is undertaking a complete redesign of its Brooklyn bus network. In a recent letter, Senator Felder urged President Byford to focus attention on improving the disastrous service delivery of the B11, which services over 10,000 riders a day who are consistently plagued by its unreliability. Adding insult to injury, riders who used to be able to text 511 for updates can no longer do so. "On November 21, I attended a public outreach hearing at Kensington Library to ensure that the needs of our neighborhood are heard," stated Senator Felder.



On Tuesday, November 12, Senator Simcha Felder held a press conference on the steps of City Hall asking the Mayor to keep his promise to special needs children and their families.

Below are excerpts of his speech:

"We are here for the kids and the parents. For the kids who are once again being neglected by the city, and for the parents who year after year suffer pain, humiliation and economic hardship from an abusive system."



"There is no magic cure known to man for permanent conditions like Down syndrome and autism, so why are these parents under constant stress to meet numerous deadlines and submit mounds of documentation year after year to secure necessary services? It's unconscionable. Mr. Mayor, these children are just like all other children; they deserve the best education possible and they deserve your attention."

"But, you have been negligent in your care for this vulnerable population. Repeated, well-documented efforts in the form of meetings, letters and phone calls to your office have all been ignored. For

They are once again begging for help, informing me that the DOE is doing everything within its power to make the process difficult. Too many parents have expressed how time-consuming and challenging it is to get their children the services that DOE is legally serviced to provide.

The most common concern is that DOE fails to respond in a timely manner. This appears to be especially true in regard to payments that are due - or more likely overdue. Whether parents are successful at a hearing or agree to a settlement. DOE does not appear to processes payments to these families for many months or in some cases over a settlement. These children carry diagnoses of permanent, pervasive conditions. The emotional toll on parents cannot be overstated; the waste of valuable time and energy, already so overtaxed in families with a special needs child, is unconscionable.

After 13 years, children and families are still suffering humiliation and financial burden from a special education system that is more burdensome and bureaucratic than ever. Five years have passed since you issued memo and held a press conference outlining your commitment to these families, and aday it appears to have become mostly talk. It is past time DOB be brought in compliance with the law and ensure students with disabilities appropriate placements and timely reimbursements for their education.

Fulfill your commitment to ease the burden on families of special needs children. Cut the red tape, speed up he process, and let's finally reach outcomes that do right by these families.



years, parents of children with special needs have had to wait for the City to settle legitimate claims for tuition reimbursement. Left with no other choice, we have come here to stand at your doorstep, because we cannot let them suffer alone."

"In 2014 you held a press conference where you said every child in this City deserves a quality education. 'Today, we are turning the page, making changes that will ease the burden on these parents. We are cutting red tape, speeding up the process and reaching outcomes that do right by families.' That was your promise in 2014. It is now 2019 and things haven't changed."

"We are not asking for any favors. The City is lawfully obligated, under federal law (IDEA) to provide appropriate education and services in a timely manner. The deadlines are clear - at most it should take two months to resolve disputes and begin making reimbursements, not two years! Unfortunately, that is now common."

"The law has been ignored, the deadlines ignored, the bills ignored. NYC DOE is not in compliance with the law. New Yorkers are required to abide by the law. Compliance is not an option, it's the law - and New York City is not above the law.

"Please, Mayor de Blasio, keep your promise to these kids and their families. They've suffered long enough."

HEAP application period is now open. Applicants over the age of 60 can apply at my office. Applicants under the age of 60 must apply in person at an approved HEAP site such as COJO of Flatbush 718 377-2900 and Boro Park JCC 718-972-6600.

HEARTSHARE will open on February 1. Applicants must have HEAP and a National Grid heating bill to qualify. Last year, my office facilitated over \$30,000 in Heartshare grants in just two weeks.

Legislative Updates

FELDER BILL TO INCREASE TAX CREDIT FOR VOLUNTEER FIRST RESPONDERS

Senator Simcha Felder (Midwood) and Assemblywoman Aileen Gunther (Forestburgh) introduced legislation (S6802) that would increase the Volunteer Firefighter and EMS State income tax credit for the first time in 12 years. The current \$200 tax credit for active volunteers has remained unchanged since first established in 2007. This important legislation would increase the credit to \$500 for eligible individuals and \$1,000 for married joint filers who do not receive any direct monetary compensation for their service. If enacted, the credit would go into effect for taxable years beginning in 2020.

"Volunteer firefighters and first responders including Hatzalah members are on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. No matter the weather, the conditions or the time of day, these extraordinary people answer the call to keep New Yorkers safe," said Senator Simcha Felder. "It is time to recognize their invaluable contribution by updating and increasing this tax credit."

FELDER FIGHTS TO COMBAT ROBOCALLS

"Moreover, people are being conned and victimized to the tune of millions of dollars with a new scam every few weeks preying on seniors and vulnerable New Yorkers.
The Robocall Prevention Act (S3297) will curb unwanted robocalls in New York by

The Robocall Prevention Act (S3297) will curb unwanted robocalls in New York by enacting stringent new restrictions, requirements and penalties that include:

 $\boldsymbol{\cdot} Requiring$ telephone companies make free call blocking technology available to customers

•Prohibiting fraudulent "spoofing" using disguised numbers

•Granting the State Attorney General new enforcement powers to go after scammers with harsh penalties for violators who would face fines as high as \$2,000 per illegal robocall

·Giving New Yorkers the right to sue illegal robocallers

During the last session, the Robocall Prevention Act was passed in the State Senate, but was not taken up in the Assembly. "I intend to continue fighting to see this bill passed in both houses in 2020 and signed into law. This bill is the toughest action taken by any state in the nation to deal with robocalls. New Yorkers deserve nothing less," concluded Senator Felder.

NEW CENSUS SCAM

Impersonating U.S. Census outreach, by phone or in person, is the newest way con artists are trying to steal your identity, money or possessions. Scammers try to intimidate and scare you or earn your trust by impersonating government officials. Here's what you need to know to protect yourself:

•While federal law requires responding to the Census, you cannot be imprisoned.

•Although you may be fined for failing to respond, genuine representatives do not request or collect any form of fines or payments.

•Genuine Census representatives never ask for your Social Security number, mother's maiden name, bank or credit card numbers.

•Legitimate census takers who come to your home will have a Census Bureau photo ID badge (with a Department of Commerce watermark and an expiration date) and a copy of the letter sent to you.



Senator Felder Meets with BINA Stroke and Brain Injury Assistance

Senator Felder visited the office of BINA, a unique organization that provides services to stroke and brain injury survivors in the district and beyond. The founder and director of BINA, Chavie Glustein, gave the Senator an overview both of the prevalence and complexity of brain injury, and of the comprehensive services that BINA provides to survivor and family.

"For example," explained Ms. Glustein, "if the individual went into cardiac arrest and lost oxygen to the brain, people won't recognize that the often serious deficits that occur are actually due to a brain injury."

Tzippy Friedler, BINA's Director of Case Management, described the confusion and turmoil experienced by families in the aftermath of a stroke or traumatic brain injury. "We've been very involved with a family who was completely overwhelmed by the decisions that had to be made in the aftermath of their

10 year old daughter's stroke - from choosing a rehab facility to figuring out complicated insurance issues to arranging for home care and outpatient therapy."

Senator Felder inquired about the services available to the brain injured population, children in particular, and was surprised to learn that despite the many excellent programs and agencies that exist for various disabilities, there are significant gaps in the system when it comes to brain injury.

"It was very important for me to learn about the unique challenges of the brain injured population and I look forward to doing my part at the state level to ensure that they get all the help that they need," said Senator Felder.
